Types of Arson Laws in Utah

For those wondering "what is arson," the arson definition in Utah is using fire or explosives to damage the property of someone else or for the intent of trying to fool (often called defrauding) an insurance company. For those wondering, "is arson a felony," anyone who uses fire or explosives to damage property is guilty of either a second-degree felony (often called 2nd-degree arson) or a third-degree felony if the property value exceeds \$1,500. If the value of the property is less than \$1,500, the crime is considered a misdemeanor as long as the fire does not endanger another person.

1st-degree arson in Utah is typically called <u>aggravated arson</u>, as this is a first-degree felony. **Someone is guilty of aggravated arson if fire or explosives are used to damage a structure where someone else is present, such as a habitable structure.**

Consequences You Face if Found Guilty of Arson in Utah

Arson punishment in Utah can be stiff. One of the most common aggravating factors is whether or not there was a potential for someone to be injured or killed in the blaze. For 2nd degree arson, the punishment may be as high as \$10,000 and up to 15 years in prison. On the other hand, aggravated arson could even carry a penalty of life in prison. The statute of limitations on arson will vary with the degree of arson, ranging from a few years to no statute at all for the most severe types of arson.
